Petty Thefts Plague Belville; Unclaimed Notes Found in Ashes of Solstice Bonfire

An epidemic of missing objects threatened to ruin this year's summer solstice celebration. But in the wake of the party, a heartwarming tale is revealed.

The summer solstice celebration, known and loved by many as the holiday "Litha," is observed every year on the longest day. This year, however, Belville's residents struggled to get into the

New evidence has come to light suggesting not only an answer to the confusing crimes, but also a tale of unexpected light. Transcribed below, for the readers' perusal, is a set of five notebook pages found at the site of the solstice bonfire. -----Page One

----Page Three

[Date burned off, however we feel confident it was three days before the solstice]

- → Lavender says guests at the inn heard strange singing in woods
- → Location: in clearing halfway up ridge trail?
 - → Nothing there
- → Priya says set of 7 flat pencils, all colors, stolen

——-Page Four

[Smudged date indicates two days before the solstice]

- → Brick used as doorstop at bookstore missing (Luca)
- → Checked ridge trail again, nothing

——-Page Five

[Dated day of the solstice]

- → Witch coming 2pm to scry for Priya's coin
- → Singing on ridge reported (Gloria)
- → Circle found in clearing!!
- → Seven arches, one brick
 - → Arranged around coin
- → Tops of arches = pencils
 - → Perps: earth sprites?
- → Seem to be singing about duty to sun goddess ...

The astute reader will notice that our collection appears to be missing a note for the day before the solstice. A survey of town indicates that nothing was stolen that day, and therefore there was no need for notes.

Luca, resident historian and owner of the bookshop, confirms that earth sprites have been seen before in the forests outside of town.

"They're very shy," he informed us. "And only about three inches high, according to this scroll I found. They talk and worship just like us, but they don't look like what you might expect ... Some people say they look like large, dark pompoms with tiny little arms and googly eyes."

It's easy to see how an arch as high as, for example, one large carrot might serve as a "henge" for a creature no bigger than an orange.
